After talking with several O.D.s who attended, the consensus was they were happy they could serve those in need. The purpose of the ASDAO Auxiliary Scholarship is to recognize excellence in scholarship and encourage Seventh-day Adventist individuals with potential to complete their educational requirements in the field of Optometry.

REPORT OF PATHWAYS TO HEALTH APRIL 2015, SAN ANTONIO, TEXAS

Nineteen optometrists, 3 ophthalmologists, many volunteers worked for two and a half days performing approximately 2000 eye exams. Service was the password and so, both doctors and patients were blessed.

The day started with long lines outside of the Alamo Dome. Some people waited most of the night before. When they got to the vision section they were given an autorefractometer and medical history was taken. The next step was basic exam and refraction.

Most patients needed new glasses and were sent to pick out frames. Some single vision glasses were edged on site in the VSP van but most were ordered and sent to the nearest SDA church of patient's choosing to be dispensed. All medical conditions, diabetics, cataracts etc. were referred to an ophthalmologist. Any medical condition that needed more care or surgery was referred to a representative of the local medical society who scheduled them for further donated care.

This is the second time I have volunteered for the Pathway to Health program (San Francisco 2014 was the first). Both programs were exceptionally well organized and any doctor who wants to give and receive a blessing should plan to participate in the next planned (ASI) Pathway to Health in Spokane Washington in August 2015. Reece and Meister honored for their service to their denomination and the healthcare profession in the United States and abroad

Two Seventh-day Adventist physicians were awarded the denomination's Health Ministries Medal of Distinction for their decades of extraordinary service to the Church and in the communities they have served.

Dr. E. Albert Reece, distinguished professor and dean of the University of Maryland School of Medicine, and Dr. Harold Lowell Meister, Jr., were awarded during Spring Meeting, an annual meeting of executive officers of the Seventh-day Adventist Church last month.

Reece, dean of Maryland's School of Medicine, serves as a professor at the university's departments of Obstetrics and Gynecology, Medicine, and Biochemistry & Molecular Biology. He is also member of the Institute of Medicine of the National Academy of Sciences.

In October 2014, Reece was appointed as an honorary associate Health Ministries director for the Seventh-day Adventist world church. In his role as honorary associate director, he consults for the department on chronic diseases. The key, he said, is to focus on breaking the chain of inter-generational rates of obesity and diabetes among mothers and their children.

A native of Jamaica, Reece has had an impressive academic career in research, teaching and administration. He received post-graduate training at Columbia University and Yale University. At his home church, he enjoys participating in Sabbath School, and co-chairing the health ministries outreach.

Dr. Harold Lowell Meister, Jr. is a retired optometrist with decades of optometry expertise.

In 1959, Meister and his wife, Dellene, moved to Nowata Oklahoma, where he started a practice that served the community for 54 years. He was also a member of the Nowata Chamber of Commerce, where he served as president for one year. He also served the Nowata community as a member of the Nowata School Board.

For more than 50 years, Meister served the denomination through various roles, including his time on the Oklahoma Conference Committee and Southwestern Union Conference Committee.

Meister also served as the assistant director of visual affairs of the Health Ministries Department for the Seventh-day Adventist Church. As Assistant Director of Visual Affairs, he visited eye clinics in 6 African countries where he acted as an advisor to eye care professionals who operated the facilities.

Meister attended Southern Missionary College near Chattanooga Tennessee. He also attended Southern College of Optometry in Memphis Tennessee where he graduated with a bachelor's degree in optical science and a doctor of optometry. Both of the honorees were surprised to be presented with the award. Their highest service and vigorous energy remains dedicated to the God they love, and to the Church they cherish.

YOUR BEST PATHWAYS TO HEALTH MISSION TRIP TO SAN ANTONIO, TX 2015

My family and I had the privilege of participating in this fantastic event in San Antonio, TX along with several of you. The free mega health clinic was organized under ASI (Adventist Laymen's Services and Industries) and set up in the Alamodome. The total number of patients seen in all areas were 6,192. Over \$20.1 million in health care services were provided to the San Antonio community over a three day period.

Services provided included vision, dental, primary medical care, women's health, and several other specialties including neurology, wound care, podiatry, gastroenterology, and more. Other services included lifestyle counseling, food preparation classes, chaplain services, and even haircuts and 500 men's suits were also provided free of charge.

The event served lunch each day to all 1,700 volunteers and the patients who were in the clinic over the lunchtime. There were 4 lines outside the Alamodome for patients to choose from: dental, vision, medical, and surgery. On the first day, I had a patient who was about 60 years old. I saw him around 4 o'clock in the afternoon. When I asked him "how are you?" when he first came into my exam room he said, "better, now that I'm able to see someone." I could tell he was tired and a little frustrated. I was tired too by that time, but I prayed that the Holy Spirit give me the words he needed to hear. He told me how he had waited since early in the morning (I think around 4 or 5 am) in the dental line. Many others in front of him had waited all night in line. The line was so long that around noon they counted off the number of people in line that could be seen the rest of the day in the dental clinic, and he was turned away along with hundreds of others. He was offered other services at the clinic that might be able to see him. He chose to try the vision line in hopes he could get in there because he needed new glasses. He waited all afternoon and finally got to see me by around 4 pm. He told me of how he had been diagnosed with stage 4 bladder cancer 4 years earlier and was given only 2 years to live at that time. He continued to tell me some more about himself and his story. He believed in God and the Bible, and I was able to remind him about the hope of Jesus' second coming, how he would be healed then, but I prayed with him for healing now if it was God's will, and peace and strength. We talked about other things that only the Holy Spirit could bring to my mind to tell him for those few minutes. When he got up to go, he told me he was so blessed by our conversation that all the waiting he had done all day in both lines was worth it just to talk to me. I praised God I could be used by Him to refresh this man's soul that he so desperately needed, and that he waited in line and didn't leave after he was turned away from the first service he thought he needed, and that he waited in line and didn't leave after he was turned away from the first service he thought he needed.

I talked with the other 37 people that went to San Antonio from my hometown of Greeneville, TN, it seems like everyone who participated in this event had multiple stories like this too. We were all so greatly blessed to be used by God as a tool in His toolbox for just the right job He had for us to do. We were also convinced that this method of mixing the gospel message with the medical work is so effective in reaching others, that truly it confirmed yet again, that "Christ's method alone" will bring true success in reaching the world.

I would encourage all of you who ever has a chance to participate in one of these events to do so. You will be blessed. Their next event is in Spokane, WA from August 2-4, 2015. See www.bigcitybenevolence.org for more details.
