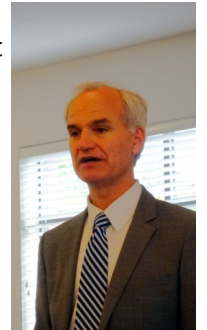


2014 ASDAO CONVENTION GREAT TIME

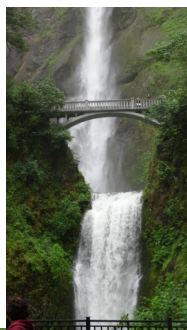
The evening was enjoyed with the annual banquet and auction, which was a big success for the auxiliary. With close to \$3,000.00 raised for their projects and Scholarships.

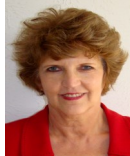

ASDAO FOUNDER DR. CLARENCE OMANS PASSED AWAY AT 99 YEARS 8 MONTHS OF AGE

On a very cold day on December 25, 1914 in Detroit Lakes, Minn., Claire Omans was born to Earl and Mary Omans. The temperature was 17 degrees below zero.

When he was about 6 years old his parents moved from Detroit Lakes to New York Mills, where they bought a 40 acre farm. It was at this location that Clarence started school. It was a small 8-grade country school about 1 ½ miles from his home. He walked to school every day. In winter the snow would drift so high that he could walk on the top of the fence-row. One Sabbath his family had to go to church by horse and sleigh because the snow was too deep for cars. By the time he was in the 2nd grade his parents were wanting him to have a Christian education, so they sold the farm and moved to Battle Creek, Michigan where he was enrolled in the Battle Creek Academy School.

In 1923 Clarie enrolled in the third grade at Battle Creek Academy where he stayed through high school, graduating in 1933. It was during the school days at Battle Creek Academy that he somehow got the nickname of Claire which he used throughout his life except for legal purposes.

His schooling occurred during the depression and he earned money for his school bill by buying and selling cars. By the time he graduated from 12th grade he had bought and sold several old cars for profit.

He attended Emmanuel Missionary College (now Andrews University) in 1933-34, but then returned home to Battle Creek to be the right hand man for Dr. John Harvey Kellogg. He drove for him, did errands and worked as a bell hop in Florida at Miami Battle Creek Sanitarium. He worked for Dr. Kellogg for two years and became well acquainted with him personally. He next spent a year at Battle Creek College finishing his pre-optometric course and working at The Battle Creek Food Company for Dr. Kellogg.

Clarie enrolled in 1937 at the Illinois College of Optometry and graduated in the summer of 1940 with his Doctor of Optometry Degree. He was fortunate to be offered an internship by the eye Department of the Battle Creek Sanitarium. This hospital was well known for its wellness vacations.

It was here at the Sanitarium that he met a girl by the name of June Shoup from Lansing, Michigan. That relationship turned into marriage on August 31, 1941 in the Lansing SDA church, presided over by June's father, who was pastor of the Lansing Church.

Claire opened his first practice in Buchanan, Michigan where he stayed for 2 years before returning to Battle Creek, where he took over a long standing practice in the heart of downtown.

In 1955, Clarie and his lifetime friend, Dr. Ralph Howard merged their practice and bought a Texaco filling station next to the Kellogg Auditorium in a choice location in Battle Creek. They formed one of the first professional corporations allowed in the State of Michigan. They named it Vision Services, PC.

Clarie was one of the founders of the ASDAO which began in 1959. Having perfect attendance to all the ASDAO convention meeting up through the 2011 meeting in Louisville KY. He served in about every office and host available.

Clarie was not only active in his profession but also in other organizations. While in Battle Creek, he was a Director and Secretary of the Board of the Battle Creek Sanitarium and Hospital until it joined Hinsdale Health System in 1993. He was a board member of Battle Creek Academy for 30 years and its Chairman for 28 years. He saw his two daughters graduate from there and spent many hours with school business. Clarie also served on the Michigan Conference Executive Committee for 10 years under the leadership of Robert Moore and Charles Keymer.

In 1983, Dr. Omans was honored for 34 years of community health service by the Michigan Hospital Association and was presented the Hospital Governance Award at a banquet at Boyne Mountain Lodge in Boyne Falls, Michigan. He also was a member of the Southwest Hospital Council, Battle Creek Hospital Commission.

In September of 1983, June and Clarie moved into the new house that they had built in Hendersonville. They did drive back to Battle Creek every other month for 13 years for business reasons.

It wasn't long before Clarie became active as an elder in the Arden SDA church and served as it's finance chairman for 11 years.

Clarie was on of the Board of Directors of the Park Ridge Hospital for 11 years, and a member of its finance committee. From 1987-2001, Clarie served as ASDAO Assistant Director for Vision Affairs in the Health Ministries Department of the General Conference of SDA. This work kept him busy on the phone many times between 1 AM and 4 AM in the morning, due to overseas phone calls.

The last three months of June's life he became a 24 hour a day caretaker, including the domestic duties, housekeeping, meals and going to all of their medical appointments. He stepped up to the plate and did what was needed because of his love for June. She was the love of his life for 72 years. She died on Sept 16, 2013, and at that time he sold their home and moved into Fletcher Park Inn. He lived there for 11 months, and in the last 3 months there his health took a downward spiral. Life became very difficult for him with no house, no wife and no car. All he wanted in those last months was to be with June and be at peace. He died at Elizabeth House Hospice on August 11, 2014. He was a great friend, and mentor....He will be greatly missed

ASDAO GC VISION BOOTH

The next SDA General Conference Session is little over one year away. We have been asked by the General Conference to provide a booth in the exhibit hall for vision care. After consulting with several veteran ASDAO members, we have decided to take a different approach to our vision booth and the services we provide.

As you know, measuring IOPs, VAs, and direct O-scope have very little diagnostic value to the attendees, and possibly giving a false sense of good ocular health. Even though this approach was well received by the public and perceived as a valuable service, we are looking at a different approach for 2015. Educating attendees about what a vision exam is and what we are able to see and diagnose would be in their best interest.

Here are some of the ideas we are considering:

Eyemaginations has granted us the use of their full computer program during the convention time to show animations of ocular disease conditions, and ocular procedures. We plan to project these on a large screen or HD TV.

OD's will provide consultations for medical conditions, give out AOA pamphlets, show Eyemaginations animations for appropriate ocular conditions, and educate attendees on importance of regular vision exams.

OCT screenings may be available for a select group of attendees

Literature for healthy life styles

We need your ideas for our booth, for presentation and content. What brochures or information sheets we will provide need to be decided at the convention. E-mail us with your ideas and comments.

Dellene and I arrived in Geneva, Switzerland about noon July 7th to attend the 2nd Global Conference On Health & Lifestyle. After checking into our hotel we went to register at the Uni Mail, University of Geneva where our meetings were held. It was nice to see Doctors Landless, Handysides, Kuntaraf, Proctor and Beth Pettit and others from the Health Ministry Department of the GC. I was pleased that they called me by my first name. These are friendships that are very dear to me and I will miss them as I am stepping down from my position as Assistant Director of Visual Affairs as soon as Dr. Bob Roberts has been confirmed as my replacement. I have enjoyed this work very much and thanks for the opportunity to serve.

Dellene and I attended about thirty hours of lectures and workshop breakouts. The meetings were excellent and they will be on the Health Ministry web site in about two months. The program was about Non-Communicable Diseases and Lifelong Lifestyle Prevention. Non-Communicable Disease are diseases we place upon ourselves. Obesity, Diabetes, High Blood Pressure, Mental Health and Smoking, Alcohol, and Drugs. These conditions are almost all self induced. The cure for these problems is The Health Message that was given to Seventh Day-Adventist years ago. There are eight in number. Nutrition (plant based), Fresh Air, Sunshine, Exercise, Rest, Temperance (do not do good things to excess, no Smoking, Alcohol, or Drugs). Exercise is the magic pill and over eating is one of our biggest problems. I'm sure you will agree that these are the keys to good health. Do we practice what we believe?

Elder Ted Wilson's Sabbath Sermon reminded us that God is going to use us, we are a family, local, national, and world church. His morning text was 3 John 2. "Beloved, I pray that in all things thou may prosper and be in health, even as thy soul prospereth". Health Reform and the Three Angels Message go hand in hand. God's people will not be eating meat during the Loud Cry. The question is are we ready as a people to give the last call. Elder Wilson practices the Vegan Diet. He told us that with the SDA diet we live seven years longer than the world. However if you are vegan you can add five more years to your life. When I got home after a trip to Rome I got out the books Councils on Diets and Food and Ministry of Healing (which were recommended for us to reread) and immediately began to notice I could make changes that would help me live longer and be more connected to the One I want to lead in my life.

Quiet Hour Costa Rica Mission Trip 2014

This was the first medical mission trip that I have taken as an optometrist. Obviously, I didn't know quite what to expect. When Dr. Dennis Benedict encouraged me to go on a medical mission trip, I told him I would only consider it if he was going so I could learn what to do. It wasn't too much later that I got the call from him that the Southern Union was trying to organize their first medical mission trip. They were planning on going to Nicaragua and wanted several family physicians, dentists, and eye doctors to go with them. I had talked to several of my staff who were also interested in going on an eye mission trip so I got permission to invite any of them to go as well. One of my opticians, April Johnson, said she could afford the cost to go so we both planned to go with Dennis along with an ophthalmologist as part of the eye team. We were all set to go, but alas, the Southern Union had to cancel the trip two weeks prior to leaving because they couldn't get the appropriate cooperation from the central Nicaraguan government even though the local governments were begging the team to come. We all were very disappointed.



Then, Dennis called me and said that Quiet Hour was organizing a very large 2-3 week medical mission trip to San Jose, Costa Rica and needed an eye team. Needless to say, this appealed to us greatly because we had heard Costa Rica was a beautiful country. This was the first time Quiet Hour teamed up with Southern Adventist University (SAU). SAU was sending about 12 nursing students along with some other students with various majors such as marketing, education, and theology to help out in preaching, running the VBS programs, and helping in the medical clinics.



Due to our schedule, we could only go for the last week of the trip, but we had a great time. There was 12 different churches that they held meetings at every night and the medical teams would rotate the clinics through these different churches. Dr. Jim Tillman lead the eye team the first half of the trip, then Dennis replaced him until we could join them the last week. About 400 of the 2,000 patients that came through all the clinics during the entire mission trip came through that last week April and I were there so Jim and Dennis did much of the work alone. After joining Dennis we had two exam lanes and thankfully we each had bilingual nursing students during most of the time to translate for us. It was not only a lot of fun to help those coming through the clinics, but it was fun to teach the nursing students about eye disease and optics as well. Due to the elevation and proximity to the equator we obviously saw many pterygia and cataracts. Dennis expected this and had brought many sunglasses which were completely dispensed.



Dennis' wife, Eddie, went on the trip as well and helped April in the optical. In addition, we were blessed to have students and other helpers perform auto refractions and visual acuities.

I really appreciated how Quiet Hour does ministry. They use Jesus' method of meeting the people's physical need first with the medical clinics during the day. Then they offer to meet the people's spiritual need with meetings for the adults and VBS programs for the children in the evenings. Approximately 200 people were baptized with many more continuing to study.



Needless to say, with the organizational experience of Dennis, our clinics ran very smoothly and I learned a tremendous amount. I would encourage all of you to go on a mission trip and use the talents that God gave you to help those who God puts in your path.
